From Pastor Christine...

This month (June 13-22), a group of folks from Prince of Peace will be traveling to Cuba for a cultural immersion trip. As I write this we are anxiously excited about our adventure: we've gone through all the checklists, gathered some donation items, made flight reservations, and even hypothesized about what the trip will be like, but truth be told we aren't exactly sure what we are getting ourselves into.

It's a strange situation to be in. Typically, no matter where any of us travel - whether it's for business, vacation, or a mission - we can find someone who has been there before, scour vacation guides, research on the web, or just follow the itinerary.

This trip isn't that way. Cuba is an unknown land, unknown culture, and unknown people. At least they are to us. Two things strike me about this:

- 1. What it feels like to step into something completely foreign.
- 2. What it might feel like to be someone so utterly unknown by the rest of the world.

As the 'facilitator' of this trip, I must admit I feel like Moses: leading a small band of people into unknown territory, to encounter unknown people. The whole confluence of circumstances is a metaphor for journey of the Israelites. The similarities woven into these two stories (the journey of the Israelites from Egypt to the Promised Land and the journey of us from Maryland to Cuba) remind us that contained within the unknown are facets of ourselves and of God.

I know that may sound simplistic and it may also sound like it doesn't pertain to you if you aren't heading to Cuba, but that truth is absolutely relevant to your life for one reason:

God calls us to step into the journey of unknowns. We often try to control our itinerary of life, hoping that with more information we will be able to have the journey of a lifetime, but it doesn't work that way. I am a self-professed

control freak. Freedom where anything is possible can sound very scary and debilitating when we focus on answers and outcomes.

I don't know what your 'unknowns' are but I do know that we all have them. I do know it's hard to step into the 'unknown,' but I'd like to ask you to make that first step into your known as those of us traveling to Cuba take our first step into that 'unknown'.

Your first step might be: saying the first words of a needed hard conversation, it might be admitting you want more from your job, it might be beginning to look at college, or it might be asking for help.

It might even be standing at the threshold, peering into the great unknown and whispering a silent prayer to God and asking Him to guide your steps and be your pillar of fire in the night.

My prayer for each of you at Prince of Peace through the month of June, will be for your unknowns to become known to you so that you might know God more intimately and yourselves more deeply.

SPOTLIGHT is a new column which focusses on a group in or resource provided by PoP. This month we are looking at Kids at Services.

Does your child (big or little) want to stay with you during services but tends to be antsy? Just look to Kids Corner. Kids Corner is located in the Narthex near the coat closets. Look on and under the table to find a variety of quiet activities.

Each week a new set of Kids Bulletins are available. These bulletins, Pre-Reader and Reader, are geared to the selected readings and main topic for that Sunday. (When we have Wednesday services, the previous Sunday bulletins are still out.) Bags of crayons and a basket of pencils are available to fill-in and answer the activities and questions. Storybooks for young children and children's Bibles are, also, on top of the table.

Under the table is a large basket with coloring books, sticker books, and activity books.

If you and your child prefer, the nursery is staffed during all services. Many activities from playing grocery store to cooking in the kitchen to playing with cars to coloring are available. Take your child back just before service starts, immediately after the Children's Sermon, or make an impromptu decision during the service. The nursery attendant, AJ, is waiting.
