
Ashes to Go!

One of the big themes of Lent is the call to "repentance." And the word "repent", in Greek, means "change." Jesus' call to repentance, therefore, is Jesus' call to change.

And while most years we can hear this call and think, "yeah, there probably are a few things in my life that need changing", in the past year most of us have already probably had enough of change! We've had to change the way we work; the way we go to school; the way we interact with our friends and family; and even the way we worship. As we begin this month, at Prince of Peace, we're beginning to live with the change of Pr. Christine not being our Associate Pastor anymore. Yeah, most of us have had enough of change!

But here's the thing about Jesus' call to change: Jesus' call to change isn't just a command for us to do something, it's also a promise that God is doing something, too. Whenever Jesus asks people to change, he's promising that he's going to be leading them through that change. Whenever Jesus asks people to change, he's promising them that he will help them to make the change. And whenever Jesus calls people to change, he's promising that God is calling them into a future that's worth changing for, even if the change now is difficult.

As we've lived through these last many months, we've endured a lot of changes. Indeed, even the changes we make today may need to be changed tomorrow. And as we return to "normal", hopefully later this year, that too, will require change.

So as we live through the season of Lent, and hear Jesus' call to change, don't just focus on the "command." Instead, listen for Jesus' promise to lead us through the changes. Look for the ways Jesus is working in your life to help you through those changes. And look forward to the new future which Jesus is calling us to change into.



Bible Art Journaling typically meets one Sunday evening per month. Our next gathering will be February 6 from 6pm-


