### From Pastor

Steve...

Just after Christmas, Prince of Peace was able to get all of our lights, both inside and outside of our building, replaced with LEDs. We did this through a Pepco rebate program, so we only ended up paying about \$2K to get \$20K worth of work done! (Special thanks to Bill Harral for shepherding the program through for us!)

The lighting change will make a huge difference for us. It will be great for our electric bill. It will be great in reducing our carbon footprint. And it will mean that we'll rarely have to climb ladders to replace the lights in the ceiling of the sanctuary!

And in this season of Epiphany, we celebrate another "lighting change." We celebrate the revealing of the light of Jesus in the world. That's really what "epiphany" is all about - it's about noticing the light of Jesus in our lives, celebrating the light of Jesus' presence, and sharing the light of Jesus with others. But all of those things often require effort on our part.

You might not notice the lighting changes at church unless you're here at night to see how much brighter the parking lot is, or unless you see how the energy savings are affecting our bills and carbon footprint. And often, noticing the light of Jesus means practicing being actively attentive to the ways God is working in our lives, particularly in dark moments.

And because it's easy to miss the light, it's often easy to feel like nothing's different. In our world at the moment, a lot of things seem stuck. And so, it's easy to wallow in the darkness. But the season of Epiphany calls us to actively celebrate the presence of the light of Jesus in our world, even and especially when it still feels like night outside.

And of course, the reason that there are Pepco rebates is because lowering our carbon footprint and decreasing demand on the grid benefits others besides us. And even so, the light of Jesus in our lives isn't just so we can personally enjoy God's love and presence, but so that we're empowered to share that light with others through our actions, words, and attitudes. Sharing the light is sometimes the most important thing we're called to do as Christians.

So, in this season of Epiphany, look closer for Jesus' light in your life. Make a point of celebrating the light. And look for ways to share that light with others around you who particularly need it!



### YOUTH MINISTRY

#### **Sunday School**

In our last class before Christmas break, the Lower and Upper Elementary classes combined for a lesson on Jesus being the treasure for whom people had waited a long time. We read some of the Old Testament prophesies and their fulfillment hundreds of years later in Jesus. We wondered what the magi knew that caused them to follow the star to bring their treasures to Jesus.

Sunday School leader Anne Witten had a special craft project for our learners. Using her extensive scrapbooking supplies, she had prepared everything for them to make a photo ornament. She explained each step, and then took a photo of each child. The learners used colorful Christmas tape and their imagination to make photo ornaments for them to give to someone special.









#### Fruits of the Spirit

The elementary classes have begun lessons on the Fruits of the Spirit from Galatians 5:22-23. Each week, we explore another attribute by discussing a Bible story illustrating it. For instance, we explored patience by reading how Jacob worked for seven years so he could marry Rachel, only to be tricked by Rachel's father into marrying her older sister instead. Then Laban said Jacob could marry Rachel if he agreed to work another seven years.

We talked about the patience needed to wait for something good to happen, understand people who are being difficult, and try to get through a difficult time. In all of these situations, the Holy Spirit is in us, helping us to have patience.

Each lesson is stand-alone, and everyone is welcome any week they are able to attend!

The Giving Tree: Through members' generosity, 8 families and their 24 children had a more joyous Christmas. Many thanks to *Rachel and Bertha Carreras* for coordinating this effort.

Christmas cheer was spread to **The Village at Rockville** with nine very full gift boxes for residents. Rhonda Ricci, Philanthropy Coordinator of TVAR, wrote, "I wanted to thank you so much for your role in the collection of items for Christmas boxes for residents at The Village at Rockville. The



response was overwhelming. We had enough items to deliver **Christmas boxes** to our residents in skilled nursing and in assisted living, almost 140 residents. The boxes were delivered on Christmas Eve Day by our connected living team members with the help from a few of our independent living residents. There were smiles all around! The Village at Rockville is blessed to have partners like you." Many thanks to *Susan Weiner and Jennifer Maloney* for leading this project.

Through the **Gifts of Hope**, members made contributions to our local Lutheran social ministries in honor of friends and family. We are grateful to *Joan Kowalik* who took the lead on this project.

We also held a coin collection to "purchase **Good Gifts" from the ELCA World Hunger Appeal** catalog. Janet Levine worked with the Sunday School classes to choose the gifts - farming school for a woman farmer, vaccinations for a child, hygiene kits, a goat and a flock of chicks, and meals for visitors to a soup kitchen. The goal was to raise \$420 to buy two of each gift. We exceeded the goal, raising \$650.03, enough to buy three of each gift. #### Social Justice Ministry News SUPPORT AFGHAN REFUGEES, OUR NEIGHBORS, IN MONTGOMERY COUNTY NOW

Afghan refugees and allies have been settled in our area. Food assistance is being provided by Manna, the Gaithersburg CARES Hub, and HELP. In addition to food, these families need clothing, household goods, money in the form of gift cards, paper and pencils, and such for the children, etc. The Guru Gobind Singh Foundation has been working with the Afghan families steadily and has established a list of needs and a drop-off point at the Singh Spiritual Center, <u>13814 Travilah Rd, Rockville 20850</u>.

#### What can you do? Just go to

https://m.signupgenius.com/#!/showSignUp/60b09 4fa4a72ca31-please to sign up. You can drop the items off on Travilah Road or bring them to POP, leave them in the box in the narthex, and the Social Justice Ministry Committee will deliver them.

You will receive an email confirmation of the item that you signed up for. If you deliver it yourself, leave the item on the table outside the main door and notify Aman Shergill at 609.751.8729 by text before dropping things off because some of the things that they are asking for are gift cards. Aman Shergill is the main contact at the Spiritual Center.

# Letter writing is an easy way to make a difference!

If you have ever felt moved to support a cause, but have worried that lack of time, transportation, or funds are holding you back? There is a way that you can help for just the cost of a stamp. A handwritten letter sent to your representative can be incredibly impactful. Just 10-15 letters sent to an office on the same topic are often all that is needed to bring an issue to an official's attention.

Some letter writing tips are:

Keep it short

- Write in with a specific ask mentioning legislation by name or number is a great way to do this
- Be respectful
- Make it personal your own voice is much more impactful than any form letter

https://www.congress.gov/members/find-yourmember and https://www.usa.gov/electedofficials make it easy to find out who your representative is, and how to reach them.

As the Social Justice Ministry Committee continues to look for ways that Prince of Peace can support Afghan Refugees as they resettle in the Washington Region, we encourage members of the congregation to support Lutheran Social Services (<u>https://lssnca.org/pressroom.html</u>) as one of the lead organizations working directly with refugee families. #### As part of a recent webinar

(<u>https://youtu.be/Vyh6dCQR3qY</u>) giving guidance on where help is most needed, Lutheran Social Services requested the following legislative support:

- HR 977 the Lady Liberty act to set a minimum floor of 125,000 refugees accepted per year by the US <u>https://www.congress.gov/bill/117th-</u> <u>congress/house-bill/977/all-info</u>
- HR 4736 the Improving Access for Afghan Refugees act <u>https://www.congress.gov/bill/117th-</u> congress/house-bill/4736/all-info
- HR 5168 the Welcomed Act provides the same federal benefits to Afghan humanitarian evacuees as Afghan refugees <u>https://www.congress.gov/bill/117th-</u> congress/house-bill/5168/all-info
- The Afghanistan Adjustment Act provide APAs with a clear path to citizenship <u>https://www.rollcall.com/2021/10/19/congres</u> <u>s-should-pass-an-afghan-adjustment-act/</u>

In addition, there is a need for more consistent federal funding - the cyclical nature of support has made it very difficult for agencies to scale up quickly to meet the current level of need.

Joining others from non-profit Haven Universe, five missionaries from Prince of Peace traveled to and served in Honduras in December/January: Chet & Nancy Wolejsza, Catherine Shober, and Ric & Grey Kienzle. Because of God's grace as well as the prayers and donations from PoP members and others in our community, many goods and services were able to be provided to those in need.

Missionaries hosted a medical brigade serving over 200 patients, and specialized doctors extended their services and medication to a population of psychiatric patients. They also visited and provided goods to CEPI, the first special-needs school in the region, ending in a celebration fiesta for the teachers, students, and their families.

Food deliveries were made to over 50 families in need, as well as a special meal for 225 individual families for New Year's Eve. Funds were provided to help build a home for a family and we had the opportunity to help in the construction.
