From Pastor Steve...

This is the time of year when we're all more acutely aware of light and darkness. The days have grown shorter. It can feel like it's late at night even when it's early evening. It may be dark when we get up. And if we have outdoor activities we want or need to do, there's a much shorter window in which to do them.

We treasure the light we have! But in fact, there's often an upside to the darkness as well. Sometimes, the darkness outside beckons us to come in and rest more than we otherwise might. The darkness provides the needed backdrop for the many gorgeous displays of holiday lights. And while the nights aren't always "silent nights", sometimes the darkness and stillness can be soothing.

Our liturgical seasons during this time of year are also centered on the themes of light and darkness. As Advent begins and the days are growing shorter, we light more candles on the Advent wreath as a sign of hope that Jesus, the light of the world, is coming. During Christmas, we read John's Gospel which reminds us that the "light shines in the darkness and the darkness did not overcome it." (John 1:5) And the word "epiphany" means not only "revealing" but "enlightenment", as we read the stories of how people came to recognize God's presence in their lives through Jesus.

It's true that often, in the Bible, darkness is portrayed negatively. And yet, it's also the case that Jesus is born into the world at night. Nicodemus comes to Jesus "at night" and learns from him. And the magi see the star because of the night sky.

In reality, God is at work in the light and in the darkness. We may look for God in the light of the happiness and joy of our lives. But sometimes, Jesus shows up in the darkness of our nights. We may want Jesus to enlighten us in big, splashy ways that everyone sees. But sometimes, like Nicodemus, Jesus shows us the way in the quiet and stillness of the night. And we may want to feel the heat of God's love shining like the sun on our

faces. But sometimes, the light of Jesus, like the light of the star, which is always there, isn't noticed by us until things get darker.

So, as we live through these next couple of months of light and darkness - and read stories in church about light and darkness - remember that God's light is shining on you, whether it's light or dark outside. Remember that God's love is always coming into your life, whether your days feel light or dark. And most of all, remember that no matter how dark it may feel at the moment, in Jesus the darkness never overcomes the light.

SPOTLIGHT

Sunday School Discovers Faraway World of LWR Quilt Recipients

Members of the Sunday School have been learning how to sew quilts for Lutheran World Relief (LWR) through an initiative by Lisa Conary. From this beginning point, the Sunday School leaders thought it might build even more purpose for the students to learn how much these quilts are appreciated by those who receive them overseas. Some of the

benefits might be ones they never would have thought of!

On Sunday, October 16, all Sunday School members and their leaders came together for a joint class to learn about LWR quilt distribution. The class was led by Anne Lomperis, a "mish (missionary) kid" who was born and raised in South India through high school graduation. She and her siblings helped their parents, who put in a 40-year career incountry, distribute food, clothing, and other donor goods like LWR quilts to the very neediest in remote, rural villages in Andhra Pradesh, a southeastern state.

The Sunday School session began by first learning where quilts and various kits (personal care, new school, and baby care) from Prince of Peace (POP) itself are sent. These destination countries are located in the Caribbean, Central and South America, West Africa, the Midde East, and Central Asia. Anne spread out lots of world maps and asked students to identify all the POP destination countries. (See table.)

Then Anne introduced the Sunday School to India and Andhra Pradesh - again with more maps. In Anne's day, Andhra included both coastal stretches along the Bay of Bengal and interior lands on the Deccan Plateau where the capital, Hyderabad, is located. Since then, however, the interior has formed its own, new state called Telangana.

Political boundaries notwithstanding, on the way from the coast to the interior was very harsh, almost unproductive, steppe land awaiting the transformation of irrigation from a major dam construction project. Pre-irrigation, there was often drought or at least insecurity in food and water supply. (Anne remembers growing up, at times, on two *sehrs* [about a quart] of water a day—one for drinking; one for everything else.)

Here in the scrubby village of Macherla, the Andhra Evangelical Lutheran Church (AELC) had an outpost clinic staffed by "Aunt Myrtle," a nurse who had previously served on horseback in Appalachia in West Virginia. (All missionaries were called "aunt" and "uncle" by the "mish kids" in the spirit of an extended family. This was because missionary families only visited their own blood relatives every five years on furlough to the States.) Aunt Myrtle worked with village elders and administrators to keep a list of the neediest so these individuals could be contacted to line up at the clinic gate on days when donor goods were going to be distributed.

To get a feel for the lives and living conditions of these most needy, Anne brought an array of props to associate with the lifestyle and circumstances of these villagers. She then asked the Sunday School students to imagine how LWR quilts could make the villagers' lives and living conditions better. Here are the paths to their discoveries. (Also see photos.)

 Pictures of huts on rice gunny sacks and village paintings; thatch artifacts of palm fronds, fans, and trays made more real that these villagers live in thatch huts.

QUILT BENEFIT: Protection from the weather, even in huts that could let in sun, rain, and wind

- 2. A straw broom and straw mat made more real that children sleep on mats laid out on swept, mud floors.
- 3. Rope and pictures of rope beds made more real that adults sleep on rope beds. Children join them during the monsoon rains when the floors are too muddy to sleep on.

QUILT BENEFIT: A high-quality, large-size blanket to sleep under - that could cover many bodies on one rope bed or on several straw floor mats

4. An umbrella made more real that villagers need protection from both hot sun and driving monsoon rains.

QUILT BENEFIT: Shade from the hot sun and protection from monsoon rains

5. A mock-kerosene lantern, clay Diwali candle, and mosquito repellent made more real that huts have no electricity or windows or screening, so "local" lighting methods attract insects and mosquitoes.

QUILT BENEFIT: Protection against insect bites and particularly mosquitoes that can cause malaria

6. A village painting of a "laundry donkey," "laundry wallah" (laundress), and rice paddies made more real that laundry is "washed" in local water sources (streams, ponds), by beating on flat rocks (no detergent), and dried by hanging on tree branches or draping on bushes.

QUILT BENEFIT: They are made of very sturdy cloth and last for decades, despite how they are "laundered."

7. A sack of donated grain with printing on the outside, which Anne modeled by wearing over slacks, made more real that this fabric could be turned inside out to make clothing like shirts - or even mend or replace worn squares from the quilts.

QUILT BENEFIT: Even though quilts are very sturdy, given squares could be replaced and extend the life of the whole quilt even longer.

Anne closed the session by sharing other artifacts from her upbringing. These included a spicy, crunchy snack for sampling and three sacred, vintage Korans that had been given to her father, a Muslim specialist and Islamic scholar. She was thrilled to have this opportunity to share information about the lives and context of those who are so appreciative to receive LWR quilts.






