VBS and Adult Bible Study



From Pastor Steve...

Every year, as summer approaches, I have a vision of how I think my summer will go. My vision includes events I'm going to be involved in, whether personally or at church. It usually includes places I hope to go and people I hope to see. And it always involves lots of time to sit on the deck, cook out and relax! And I've also realized, whether I'm consciously thinking about it or not, my visions of these things always occur on bright, sunny days!

But then it rains. And sometimes, it rains a lot. It rains when I have an outdoor event planned. It rains when I desperately need it to be dry so I can cut the grass. And it rains at the exact moment that Phoenix is expecting me to take him for a walk. And the rain irritates me.

And yet, we frequently need the rain in the summer. The grass that I complain about cutting will die without the rain. The dust and pollen in the air will continue to linger without the rain to wash it out. And, long term, too little rain will cause bigger problems down the road for our communities. The rain is needed for growth and for health.

In the same way, I don't like many of the things in my life that I think of as "spiritual rain" - the pain, the sadness and the loss that occur during times that I'd rather be sunny and happy. It's often hard to see any goodness from this type of rain. And yet, it happens whether I envision it coming or not.

But "spiritual rain" is also something God can use to help us grow. It's often in the experience of pain that God gives us strength to persevere that we didn't think was possible. It's often by experiencing sadness that we appreciate how much love and happiness a person or situation has been in our lives. And it's often at a time of loss that we can really hear the promise of new life and resurrection in a way that we simply can't when things are "sunny." Sometimes, it's through "spiritual rain" that God helps us to grow and gives us strength.

I hope that for all of us, this summer is mostly sunny and pleasant! But when days are rainy, meteorologically, or spiritually, remember that the rain is often a necessary part of growth. Remember to look for the ways God is using the rain to give you life and strength. And remember that the promise of God in Jesus is that the "rain" is never the end!

High School



Social Justice Ministry News Creating a Home for a Refugee Family

A few months ago, Pastor Christine Dunn visited POP and talked about Lutheran Social Services and its program to welcome and support refugees. There are many roles that a congregation can fulfill in this process. Social Justice Ministry met again with Pastor Christine for more details and decided that we could take on furnishing an apartment for a refugee family. On June 12th, the Committee met with two LSS staff for an orientation; at the end, we heard that a family of four was arriving on June 15th and needed our help. So, we signed up.

The family of four (father, mother, 5-year-old boy, and 3-year-old girl) arrived Thursday, June 15th. They are from Afghanistan but have been in Albania (one of 27 countries that accepted Afghan refugees)

We've already
delivered some
items to meet
short-term needs
(towels, hygiene



products, etc.). Joan Kowalik is coordinating the effort to collect and set up all the things needed to create a home for the family. This project continues POP's commitment to supporting refugees. Last year, we raised nearly \$13,000 to support the work of <u>Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Service</u>. During the year, we also created Personal Care Kits with towels, soap, toothbrushes and more, for people fleeing war or disasters; the kits are distributed by <u>Lutheran World Relief</u>.

Heartfelt thanks to the congregation for supporting these efforts with such generosity and enthusiasm!

Donating, Re-using, Recycling at the End of the Yard Sale

One goal for the Yard Sale this year was to donate, recycle and/or re-use as many of the leftover items as possible. Many individuals made this possible. Cherie DeGeorge, Kathy Mellott, Jennifer Maloney and Christina Levine took kitchen items, clothing, and hangers to Interfaith Works. Sean Dillon, Dan

Gibson and the truck crew dropped off furniture at Restore (Habitat for Humanity). Joan Kowalik posted the remaining furniture on Facebook Marketplace for free; many, many pieces were taken to be loved and used again. Jamie Pflasterer and Ian, Dekker, and Calliope Spielman delivered a truckload of books to Wonder Books. Ric Kienzle filled his truck with cardboard to recycle at the dump. Lisa and Jon Conary took the toys to the Salvation Army. Joan Kowalik also dropped off knick-knacks and décor items to the Humane Society and the Salvation Army. Thanks to everyone for putting in the extra hours to accomplish this goal, and to Pastor Steve, Jennifer Maloney, Chris Knaus, and others who took the rest

to the dump.



God's Global Barnyard

Wow!! Jingle and jangle - the barn banks came back filled with \$1,430.17 in coins, bills, and



checks. The Sunday School students decided to use the funds to send cows, piglets, goats, chicks, and honeybees to farmers around the

world. These gifts change lives, as sources of sustainable income and food. A big shout - out to Helen and Crawford Griffith who counted and packed all the coins!

Electronics Recycling

POP seized the opportunity to recycle electronics, such as laptops, computers and more, at the City of Gaithersburg recycling event in May. Thank you to Kathy Mellott, who dropped off the items.

Camp Mar-Lu-Ridge's Capital Campaign, With Open Arms, is off to a great start, but needs our help!

Mar-Lu-Ridge has been bringing school-age campers and the community closer to God and creation in a warm and inclusive environment for the last 63 years. To ensure that this legacy continues, the camp is running a capital campaign to raise funds for improvements that will increase accessibility and hospitality for years to come. Major goals of the \$2 million / 3 year campaign include:

- Making the Ridge Inn fully accessible for all guests and visitors. An elevator will be installed so that guests with mobility needs may easily and safely access the top floor. Adding public restrooms on the lower level and installing automated doors will expand camp hospitality in new ways and allow the camp to be rented out to groups, who today must be turned away due to the lack of accessible facilities.
- Improving Cabin 3 the most-requested, mostused cabin - with an accessible restroom and a refreshed interior. Siding will replace the log exterior to prevent further decay from pests.
- 3. Adding new concrete siding to protect Potomac Lodge's log structure. Carpenter bees have damaged a significant portion of the exterior. New siding will protect the outside, while preserving the logs that line the lodge's interior.
- 4. Removal of Cabins 1 & 2 (which are beyond repair and no longer usable) to increase green space. The old swimming pool at Area 3 will also be removed, since it is no longer serviceable and the rest of the area is in near-constant use by scout and community groups, thanks to renovations and upgrades by MLR staff. An accessible pavilion will be added to this space in the future.
- 5. Retiring remaining debt on the main camp water reservoir development (which needed maintenance in 2020 due to leaks).

Juneteenth Interfaith Celebration

Thank you to the Fellowship Team and the Social Justice Ministry Team for their work to host Prince of Peace's first ever



Juneteenth celebration on June 19th, held jointly with Fairhaven United Methodist Church, Shaare

Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. Despite the threat of rain during the evening, we had an amazing turnout for the event with over 170 people attending (and standing room only in the sanctuary, even after additional folding chairs had been set up). Prince of Peace's A/V team also livestreamed the event, and posted the recording on our Facebook page so that remote attendees could enjoy the festivities as well.

The evening kicked off with a processional and



music from the Fairhaven gospel choir. The music during the evening

included famous spirituals that were used as "code songs" to communicate hidden messages to enslaved people, where directions on escaping are coded into the lyrics. For instance, "Swing Low, Sweet Chariot", which was Harriet Tubman's favorite song, was a message to be ready to escape, since a band of angels were coming to take people to freedom. In the song, the Underground Railroad (sweet chariot) is coming south (swing low) to take enslaved people to the north or freedom (carry me home). Tubman used "Wade in the Water" to tell people to get into the water during an escape, to avoid being seen and make it through.

After a welcome by Pastor Steve, we then moved into prayers given by members of each community.

Speakers for the evening included Anne Witten from Prince of Peace, Bishop Josh Turley from the Kentlands Ward, Deacon Charlotte Genies from Poplar Grove, Reverend Gerard A. Green, Jr. from Fairhaven, Rabbi Annie Lewis from Shaare Torah, and John Lightfoot from St. Nicholas. As the evening's emcee, Christian Michel from Prince of Peace kept everything flowing smoothly throughout.

A special highlight of the evening was the "living



acrostic", where children and families from each of the six

participating faith communities gathered together in front of the audience. As each family read a passage from a poem, Why We Celebrate Juneteenth (adapted from the article *The Black Church and Juneteenth* by Dr. Charles Taylor), each child raised a sign with one letter until the word "Juneteenth" was spelled out.

Although Juneteenth is the newest federal holiday, celebrations of emancipation have been taking place for a long time. Sylvia Craig from Fairhaven and Jennifer Maloney from Prince of Peace both



walked us through the history. It took over 2½ years after the Emancipation Proclamation was



signed (which freed only slaves in the 10 confederate states), and the ratification of the 13th Amendment to the Constitution to fully abolish slavery in the US. Juneteenth commemorates the delivery of *General Order No.* 3 by General Gordon Granger to the people of

Texas on June 19, 1865, informing them that all enslaved persons in the state were now free. The first Juneteenth anniversary celebration took place in 1866. For more resources on Juneteenth, please visit https://tinyurl.com/JuneteenthRt28



After the program, everyone enjoyed a fun ice cream social on the patio and in the fellowship hall, with red velvet cake, red ice cream toppings, and red soft drinks provided by the other participating congregations. Shaare Torah provided partyware to use, to keep

the celebration kosher so that refreshments could

be enjoyed together by everyone. Since red is the traditional



color of Juneteenth celebrations, the fellowship team had both the hall and patio decorated with red streamers and red balloons. Fairhaven Methodist provided Juneteenth flags and centerpieces for all the tables, as well as table tents with facts about emancipation, black history, and, also, the history of the Pleasant View historic site next door to Prince of Peace - one of the original churches that merged to form the Fairhaven congregation and the location of the first school for black children in Montgomery County.

Thanks to everyone who welcomed our guests during the Juneteenth celebration, and who helped us all forge stronger connections with our neighbors!
