## **From Pastor**

It's still dark outside! Yes, I know we passed the winter solstice a few weeks ago, and now we do have SLIGHTLY more daylight than at Christmas, but it still feels dark. It's dark when I wake up. It's dark before supper time. And it just feels like long, sunny days are still far in the future.

And yet, this is the time of year when the church calendar focuses us on "epiphany" - which means "revelation" or "enlightenment." It's all about light, and people recognizing the light of Christ coming into their lives. But it still feels dark around us. It seems like an odd time to focus on the brightness of God's light.

And yet, as we read the various biblical stories in this "enlightenment" season, it often occurs to me that the light of Jesus' presence was often experienced in "dark" times - people were sick or oppressed or alone. But more than that, the "light" they experienced wasn't always a big, beaming spotlight of God's love and presence. Often, it might have seemed like just a flicker - a small beam of hope, or even a just a hint that God could actually be taking notice of them in this particular moment.

And frequently, when people do think they've had a bright moment of revelation ("Wow! I perfectly see and understand now!"), Jesus makes it clear that they're only just beginning to get it. They're not as "enlightened" as they think they are. And like others, they'll need to keep watching and waiting for the light to be fully revealed to them.

And so maybe this is a good time of the year to think about "enlightenment." For like many of those folks who first encountered Jesus, God's light in our lives often comes at moments of our lives that seem kind of dark. Often, God's "enlightenment" begins as just a glimmer, beckoning us towards something more. And frequently, as we do in February, we'll have to wait a bit longer before the fullest "enlightenment" gets to us! So, in this Epiphany season, be aware of how God's "enlightenment" in Jesus may be reaching out to you, even in dark moments and even in small flickers.

# PRINCE OF PEACE AWARDED A SACRED GROUNDS GRANT FOR NATIVE PLANTINGS

Good news! Prince of Peace, along with five other local faith communities, was just awarded a Sacred Grounds grant to beautify our grounds with native plantings that will also slow the flow of runoff and support pollinators. The grant will also provide FREE native plants that will be given away to members and our local community, for planting at home. The Sacred Grounds grant is administered by the National Wildlife Federation, with assistance from Interfaith Power and Light and Interfaith Partners for the Chesapeake. Grant funds are provided in part by the cities of Gaithersburg and Rockville, as well as the Chesapeake Bay Foundation. The other faith communities that are part of the grant are: Episcopal Church of the Ascension in Gaithersburg, St. Martin of Tours Church in Gaithersburg, Shaare Torah Synagogue in the Kentlands, Fairhaven United Methodist Church in Darnestown, and Christ Episcopal Church in Rockville.

#### How can I get involved?

The National Wildlife Federation (NWF) will be coming to Prince of Peace on Sunday, February 25<sup>th</sup> at 11am as part of our Adult Coffee and Conversation hour after Sunday services, to talk about the benefits of having native plants in yards and container gardens at home. NWF will also host a "How to Garden with Native Plants" presentation for all the participating faith communities on April 16, 2024; from 7-8:30 pm on Zoom, to give the specifics on how to successfully incorporate native plantings into your individual lawn, garden, or container garden at home. More information and the zoom link will be sent out closer to the presentation date. We will also be hosting a native plant giveaway at Prince of Peace on Sunday, May 12<sup>th</sup> (Mother's Day) after services. Show some love to mother earth on Mother's Day this year, by bringing home some beautiful native plants for your home! You can be a key part of making these events successful by attending the presentations and learning more about native plants, volunteering to help with the native plant giveaways later this year (and taking plants) home!), and by helping with a pollinator garden installation at the church this fall. The Sacred Grounds grant provides the materials and funds for

these activities - we just need to bring the people power!

Coffee and Conversation is the adult version of Sunday School. It is held at 11:00 am, after the service. Descriptions of the upcoming "lessons" follow.


