Summer is now officially over, and the fall has begun. Often, we hope that summer will be a more quiet, restful time when things go slower and we can get some rest and relaxation. But frequently, our summers are busy. And if you're like me, when you get to the end of summer, it seems like summer has whizzed by and it's all been a blur of activities! Sometimes, I feel like I still need to catch my breath before the flurry of fall activities begin.

The fall, also, is usually a time when there's a flurry of activities. This is particularly true as school begins and work schedules gear up again after the summer. At Prince of Peace, September is also a busy time, as we begin with the Interfaith 5K, start up Sunday School and Confirmation programs again, and even have a special Congregational Meeting on September 22! (Full disclosure - October will be another exciting, but busy month around here!)

And sometimes, the most important thing in these busy times is to be aware of what God is doing in our lives in the midst of our busyness and even through the many things we're doing when it's tempting to get caught up in the weeds of the details. And yet, as we read through the Gospels, this is precisely how Jesus acts. Jesus doesn't usually find a nice, quiet peaceful time to act in people's lives (and if he does - as when he and the disciples get in a boat and go to a deserted place - it quickly becomes not so quiet and peaceful as people find him!) Instead, Jesus acts in the midst of the lives of people who are on the move; in the chaos and pain of people's personal lives; and in the midst of people who are just trying to keep up with their daily chores.

That is, Jesus acts in the midst of our real and busy schedules. And often, our challenge isn't to find a quiet, peaceful time to experience God, but to be open to how God is acting even and especially in the midst of our busyness and our hectic schedules.

Here are the updates from the July Church Council meeting.

Finances: Giving continues to be equal to 2023 but a little behind this year's expenses. (Council notes).

Feast Fund: The Sacred Garden is on track for October planting.

Besecker: BYC currently has no working heat or air conditioning.

FALL FESTIVAL: is happening Sep 14, 10-3 at the church.

Native Plants/Trees: We have received a grant for a native plant/rainscape garden and for some native trees. Meetings and discussions are ongoing, and the planting area has been prepared.

Called Congregational Meeting: We currently have an AC system down in the main building (nursery) and issues with the heating system. BYC does not have working heat or cooling.

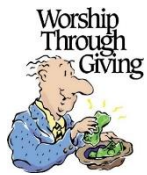
UPCOMING EVENTS

Preschool and Elementary School

We will use Group's Simply Loved curriculum, which incorporates popular VBS elements such as Bible buddies, videos, and games. This fall, our stories will revolve around the captivating journey of Moses and the Israelites, with a focus on God's unwavering care and guidance.

Our time together will begin with a devotion and a beverage, and learners will be welcome to eat their after-church snack. 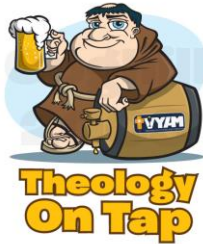
Honduras Mission 2024 Presentation!

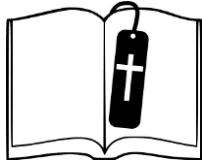


Theology on Tap

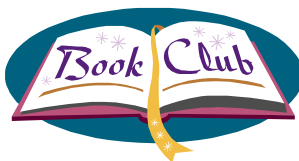

Lots of Memories Made at VBS 2024 - Camp Firelight - by Our Campers, Crew Leaders, and Adult Attendees!

It was a busy week in July as Camp Firelight VBS was held each night from Sunday, July 21st through Thursday, July 25th. Fun was had by all ages (including adults!) as we gathered together to share a meal each night at 6pm, before splitting into an adult Bible study, led by Pastor Steve, and VBS fun for preK to rising 5th graders (with our rising middle-school and high-school youth serving as crew leaders.)

Thank you to the fabulous Fellowship Team (Pamela, Melanie, Meredith, Lidia, Victoria) for all the dinners they provided, as well as everyone in the congregation who helped with donations



towards meals. The team was there early each night so that



VBS volunteers could eat right at 6pm and be ready to start the fun with campers promptly at 6:30pm. We enjoyed roasted chicken, homemade picnic salads, Taco Tuesday with all the toppings, grill nights with hamburgers and hotdogs, lots of homemade desserts and goodies (including gluten free options), and pizza on the last day.

At the VBS camp opening each night. Ms. Emma and our Camp Firelight mascot Sparky led us off with the camp callout, as well as an introduction to the



night's theme and Bible story. (Sparky's Ukrainian cousin came to visit on the last night!) Then we had energetic songs led by Ms. Sonyv along with lots of rhythm

instruments and ribbons, to get us moving. We always ended the session with the camp callout, "Whenever I'm afraid, I put my trust in You." Psalms 56:3. During the week, campers learned about many times in the Bible where people learned to put their trust in God: Jacob's journeys and dreams, Ruth & Naomi's lasting friendship, Jesus sharing wisdom in the temple, Jesus calming the storm, and Phillip's call to share Good News.

After opening, campers then made their way to Ms.



Martha's science and arts & crafts station where everyone had a chance to unleash their creativity. During the week, campers decorated bandanas with the camp callout, made mosaic crosses, and camp

journals. After craft time, elementary campers visited Dr. Jon and Ms. Lisa's Drama station, where they had a chance to really "get into the story" by acting it out. Favorites were the boat from when Jesus



calmed the storm, and the chariot where Phillip talked with a man from Ethiopia about the book of Isaiah. They then visited Ms. Emma's Games station for all kinds of fun ways to incorporate movement with the day's theme. PreK/K campers have their own special Camp Firelight location in the nursery



with Ms. Jamie where they listened to the Bible story each day in a tent, tried their hand at gathering and grinding the grain like Ruth and Naomi (it's harder than you think!) and shaking up cream to make butter to take home (it takes longer than you think, but the

shaking is a lot of fun).

Adults and campers all ended the evening together with more songs outside and s'mores around the campfire - as well as a little too much excitement the second night. We had some campers get stung by yellow jackets while leaving the campfire area at the end of the day. Lucky Ms. Lisa and Dr. Jon came to the rescue with Sting Relief from the first aid kit, and Pastor Steve followed up with some wasp spray outside by the fire ring. The rest of the



closing campfires were held around the firepit on the church patio with no other surprises, just good fun and lots of sticky marshmallows! A good time was had by all, and



we are already looking forward to VBS again next summer.

POP donated 18 casseroles which will be dinner for the residents of Shepherd's Table and Stepping Stones Shelter. Shepherd's Table in Silver Spring provides three meals a day five days a week and two meals on weekends to people experiencing homelessness or living in poverty; the

organization has provided over 41,000 meals already this year, a significant increase over 2023. Stepping Stones Shelter in Rockville provides food, shelter, and case management to families experiencing homelessness. 95% of the families served move on to stable housing within 90 days. Thank you for providing nutritious meals to help our neighbors.

Your donations to the school supplies drive was overwhelming. We were able to donate 15 completed backpacks, 5 for grades K - 2nd, 6 for grades 3rd - 5th and 4 for grades 6th - 12th.



In addition, we collected: 14 packs of paper, 39 composition books, 45 packs of dividers, 16 spiral notebooks, 13 folders including some really cool 3-D ones, 10 rulers, 19 pairs of scissors, 38 erasers, 126 pencils, 25 highlighters, 24 glue sticks, 10 packs of index cards, 212 pens, 16 packs of colored pencils, 26 boxes of crayons and 8 boxes of markers.



Once again, the kids at the InterFaith Center are going back to school with a mountain of supplies and carrying stylish back packs.
